

Our Christmas Decorations

The decorations at Providence during Advent and Christmas have a history. Many have been made by hand by members and friends. They add to the beauty of the season and to our sanctuary.

The lanterns that hang under the balcony were fashioned from Wesson oil cans, spray painted, and inserted with candles by Henry Campbell decades ago. His daughter, Grace McBride, was a lifelong member and knew all the work he put into them. Mrs. Hilda Hudson, mother of Joe and Dick Hudson, designed the lanterns and also the sconces on the walls. Mr. Campbell made the sconces from pieces of tin and tuna fish cans. To prevent a fire hazard, battery operated candles are used.

Heather Wehr, a member of the worship committee, oversees the hanging of the garlands and the greenery wreaths on the exterior doors around the campus. She also orders the poinsettias for the front of the sanctuary.

The paraments that are used on the pulpit and the communion table were cross stitched and sewn by Beverly Howard, Nancy Chambers, Betty Scarborough, Jack Howard, and Penny Harpootlian many years ago. They also made the other sets of paraments that are used throughout the liturgical year.

The Advent banner that hangs on the wall at the front of the sanctuary was made by church member Martha Gilbert. She has made many of the other banners that adorn the church throughout the year.

The beautiful stained glass nativity piece that sits on the piano was handmade in honor of Providence by Richard Rommich, father-in-law / father of Stacey and Mark Rommich.

In the lobby of the Christian Life Center there is a Christmas tree with Chrismons hanging from it. Chrismons are Christmas ornaments that symbolize Christ and Christianity. For years, the ornaments at Providence were made from blocks of styrofoam. As they aged, a church member, Judy McClanahan, took on the project to make new ones from white felt. Judy gave the patterns and felt to be cut out, stuffed, and stitched by hand. One afternoon women and teenagers sat in the parlor of the CLC, and together they decorated the ornaments with sequins, beads, pearls, and braids.

Lots of love and God-given talents have gone into the decorations at Providence Presbyterian. Women and men have created the decorations to enhance our appreciation of this special time of year in the life of the church. Many of the people are no longer living, but their gifts will last for a long time to come. Enjoy the season and worship with us!


